Section 1: NEP 2020 – Students' views at the closure of this platform 1.1. National Education Policy- Some research and My Opinion- by Nikitha: 7B

In 1986, the government led by Rajiv Gandhi introduced a new National Policy on Education. The new policy called for "special emphasis on the removal of disparities and to equalize educational opportunity," especially for Indian women, Scheduled Tribes (ST) and the Scheduled Caste (SC) communities.

The current government announced the New Education Policy 2020, which brings about several major reforms in education in India. PM Modi said that this reform would transform the lives of millions of Indians. The National Education Policy 2020 (NEP 2020), which was approved by the Union Cabinet of India on 29 July 2020, outlines the vision of India's new education system. The new policy replaces the previous National Policy on Education, 1986. The policy aims to transform India's education system by 2030.

MY OPINION:

The National Education Policy gives people of all ages, castes, religion; the opportunity to be educated. This system has helped millions of people all around the globe to enjoy equality. The policy covers elementary education to colleges in both rural and urban India. Although the environment of education might differ, the citizens will be educated to meet to maintain 'equality in education'. This policy that was launched on 1986, had brought a tremendous change in the education system. The 2020 policy aims to shape an education system that benefits for all children, in the current scenario. This newer system is moving toward making education more enjoyable and fun by including many outdoor activities such as physical training, dance, other fitness activity as a medium to enhance and apply our academic learning steps. It also includes fun indoor activities like pottery, art and craft and much more. This way students would able to dedicate more time and efforts towards overdevelopment. Altogether, The National Education Policy would further benefit all people, no matter who they are.

1.2. The NEP 2020- by Nirmay Nambiar: 7A

The N.E.P 2020 is India's new education system. This new policy strives towards making students grow in all aspects whether scholastic or co-scholastic. It also allows the students to choose and study their preferred subjects. This new policy has a new academic structure. Let's go more into detail:

The Vision of the N.E.P:

- To develop respect towards the country, the constitutional values and the fundamental rights of the people around them.
- The N.E.P is an education system which provides equal education to all no matter what.
- To instil certain skills and values to make students true global citizens.

The Key Areas of Focus of the N.E.P:

- To include all students into the mainstream of knowledge whether they
 are from rural areas or they are differently abled.
- Use of the local language in textbooks.
- Emphasize the importance of conceptual learning and critical thinking.
- To move away from the rote learning and bring about assessments like OTBA, Project Learning, etc. which is ongoing in our school.
- To make the students know more about the state and its local context.
 The textbook of a state will contain its history and knowledge about the state.
- It emphasizes computational knowledge and knowledge about technology.
- Integration of different subjects to make the students easily relate to the topic.
- To develop a scientific temper which means to be more inquisitive and to ask the reason behind something.
- No subject will be isolated but all subjects will be inter-related and interconnected.

- To learn more languages and to know the mother tongue of the state. For example- If you are in Kerala you learn Malayalam and if you shift to Tamil Nadu you learn Tamil.
- To bring in bagless days where children come to school without bags.
- Instead of the old education policy where the academic structure was broken down into 10 years + 2 years. The new academic structure is divided into four parts or phases being 5years + 3years + 3 years + 4 years.

The N.E.P wishes to bring all this to all schools and children all over India. It is an important change and must be implemented. I hope that the N.E.P is executed in an efficient manner. I feel that the N.E.P will bring about a positive change to our learning system. It will help us students to improve our skill sets. These skills will in turn enable us to help the world and thus help us become responsible citizens.

1.3. National Education Policy 2020 – by Amrita Das: 7A

The NEP 2020 announced on 29th July focuses on equal education for students from both rural and urban areas as well as differently abled students. It provides a more practical approach towards concepts and academics and enhances students' creativity. Scholastic, co-scholastic and vocational subjects will be given equal importance. All subjects would be offered at two levels and students from grades 8 to 11 will be allowed to choose subjects. According to this policy education will be made compulsory for children of 3 to 18 years of age. There will be four stages in the education of students-

- Foundational stage (three years of Anganwadi or pre-school followed by grades 1 & 2)
- Preparatory stage (grades 3 to 5)
- Middle stage (grades 6 to 8)
- Secondary stage (grades 9 to 12)

In my opinion, with proper planning and implementation by the government, the NEP 2020 would be extremely beneficial to students across the country.

1.4. National Education Policy 2020 – by Shivnanda: 6D

The New Education Policy [N. E. P. - 2020] is a masterfully crafted system which is much more interactive and, in theory, efficient than our current education system. The NEP proposes sweeping **changes** including opening up of Indian higher **education** to foreign universities, dismantling of the UGC and the All India Council for Technical **Education** (AICTE), and even the introduction of a four-year multidisciplinary undergraduate program with multiple exit options.

It provides us with an education system that contributes to an equitable and vibrant knowledge society, by providing high-quality education to all. Objectives to bring back children who've dropped out have also been passed in this policy.

One of the most notable change that the new policy will bring about is in the structure of division of levels of education. The curricular and pedagogical structure and the curricular framework for the school education will be 5+3+4 design.

- Foundational Stage (5 years)- Multilevel, play/activity-based learning.
- Preparatory Stage (3 years)- Play, discovery and activity-based learning and interactive classrooms.
- Middle Stage (3 years)- Experiential learning in the Sciences, Mathematics, Arts, Social Sciences, and Humanities.
- Secondary Stage (4 years)- Multidisciplinary study, greater critical thinking, flexibility and student choice of subjects.

1.5. What I understood from the new education policy - by Daksh Deelip: 7B

The new curricular structure will have pre-school and 1st and 2nd grade as foundational, grades 3-5 preparatory, grades 6 to 8 middle school and grades 9 to 12 are secondary school. This new system, I feel will be good, especially because there are now more phases of teaching – learning, which will help all the students from all the grades especially the lower grades. The lower grades will get a system suiting their ability and not one standard structure for ages 6-16.

The key areas of focus are as follows-

- 1) Equity and Inclusion (to support rural and urban; differently abled; adults; respect for diversity)
- 2) Use of technology
- 3) Emphasize conceptual learning and critical thinking and creativity
- 4) Foundational literacy & numeracy
- 5) 21st century skills

I feel, this will help all of us including differently abled people. All of us, people from different classes in the society will benefit from thinking and applying what we learn and also help us develop other life skills, which will be needed in our lives now as a student and later in our adult lives.

What is in for the students?

- 1) Competency based education
- 2) Development of scientific temper
- 3) Subject integration
- 4) Emphasis on digital literacy
- 5) Promotion of multi-lingual teaching
- 6) Vocational education
- 7) Text books with local content-knowledge of India
- 8) Vocational education

I feel the designed policy will enable us to think critically and connect actively and learn further to figure out solutions to problems we face or we envisage to face in future. Thereby, I agree that the vocation which we choose will develop our creativity, skills and will develop interest in us for different in certain specific fields of expertise.

1.6. NEP 2020 by Shivani Sunil: 8C

We Indians have always been proud of our old practices our traditions, religions, food, etc. One such thing we have not changed in a reasonably long time is our education system. Our ancestors used to sit in *gurukuls* and teach children ancient scriptures, which the child would have to learn by-heart. A similar way is being used to teach children even today. - 3. Its flexibility allows learners to select their preferred field of study and subsequent path in life following their academic and professional inclination and interests.
- 4. The policy will prove extremely beneficial in dismantling hierarchies and barriers between different knowledge streams by providing easy and accessible methodologies.
- 5. It will promote co-curricular activities and learning techniques in professional and academic streams. This will pave the way for a new multi/trans-disciplinary education system.
- 6. The NEP will help to replace the rote method of learning and examination-based education with a system based on conceptual understanding that aims to hone the student's analytical skills.



Section 3 - School Day by Nirmay: 7A



To celebrate Children's day, the children were asked to draw a candy shop and share the picture with us. Students did a splendid job!




