1.1-The History of Bharat Ratna:-

The Bharat Ratna Award is the highest civilian award in India. It was first awarded to C. Rajagopalachari, C.V. Raman, and Sarvepalli Radhakrishnan in 1954. When the award was created, you could only receive it in the categories of art, literature, science, and public services. Every year, the Bharat Ratna is awarded to a maximum of three people by the Prime Minister and the President of India. The award has been received only by 48 people till post publish date. Many people received the Bharat Ratna Award like Indira Gandhi (First woman awardee), Lata Mangeshkar (First singer), Sachin Tendulkar (First sportsperson and youngest awardee), among others. Receiving the Bharat Ratna should be a great honour to every Indian and if I ever receive it in my life, it will be an immensely proud moment as an Indian.

1.2- Lata Mangeshkar

Lata Mangeshkar was born on 28 September 1929, in a Marathi family in Indore. Her father was Deenanath Mangeshkar who was an artist and a singer. She carried forward this heritage and started her singing career with Marathi films. She learned music from Ustad Bade Ghulam Ali Khan, Pandit Tulsidas Sharma, and Amanat Khan Devaswale. In the year 1989, she was presented with the Dadasaheb Phalke award and in the year 2001 she was conferred a Bharat Ratna, the highest state of honour of India. She breathed her last on 6th February 2022.

1.4- Rabindranath Tagore

Rabindranath Tagore — regarded as one of the best Bengali writers of history who shaped Bengali literature and music, was born on 7th May 1861. He wrote his first poem when he was only eight years old named Abhilas. He was a poet, musician, painter, theorist and most importantly, a true Indian. Being a Bengali by heart he published the book Gitanjali in 1912. It was based on the theme of God. He was awarded the Nobel prize for writing Gitanjali. He became the first non-European to win the Nobel Prize in literature in 1930. Tagore wrote around 2,030 songs and about 2,500 paintings and drawings. He wrote the National anthem of Bangladesh and India. Even Sri Lanka's National anthem is based on a Bengali song written by Tagore in 1938. He was called the "Gurudev" of India. Tagore spent the last four years of his life in illness, pain, and comma. When he was conscious, he drafted poems about getting closer to death. Tagore breathed his last on 7th August 1941. We all remember him as the real "Gurudev" of India.

1.5-Patha Bhavana: The School Created by Rabindranath Tagore

One day in 1862, Maharishi Debendranath Tagore was taking a boat ride through Birbhum, where he came across a serene landscape canopied by chhatim trees and palm groves. He bought a large tract of land, built a small house there and named it 'Shantiniketan' or 'abode of peace.' Rabindranath visualized a school, where education was rooted in the surroundings and connected to cultures of the wider world.

"The highest educations that which does not merely give us information but makes our life in harmony with all existence." This quote by Tagore was the guiding principle of this little school.

The school aimed to educate with a sense of duty towards the larger community. Tagore blended the best western and traditional eastern systems of education to create a curriculum revolving around nature with classes held in the open air. The school was cradled in nature: Tagore wanted his students to feel free, despite being in the formal learning environment of school; he himself had dropped out of school because he had found himself unable to think and had felt trapped among the four walls of a classroom. The school later came to be known as Patha Bhavana. Nature walks and excursions were part of the curriculum, natural phenomena were paid special attention to, and students were encouraged to follow life cycles of different insects, birds, and plants.

In 1913, Tagore received the Nobel Prize of Literature for his book of poetry, *Gitanjali*. This award enhanced the prestige of Shantiniketan and during the year of 1921, Tagore converted his little school into the Visva Bharati University. His chosen motto for the University is *Yatra visvam bhavatyekanidam* (where the universe can find a nest), reflecting his hopes for the institute. Its art college, *Kala Bhavan*, is widely considered to be one of the best art colleges in the world.

1.6-MARY KOM: MY ROLE MODEL

"Without boxing, I can't live. I love boxing." This was a quote said by Indian amateur boxer, politician, and former Rajya Sabha member Mangte Chungneijang Mary Kom (Mary Kom). She was born in Kagathei village in Manipur. Her parents were tenant farmers who worked in jhum fields, and they struggled to put barely two meals a day on the table to feed their three children. Mary Kom won a silver medal at the 2008 Asian Women''s Boxing Championship in India and a fourth successive gold medal at the 2008 AIBA Women''s World Boxing Championships in China, followed by a gold medal at the 2009 Asian Indoor Games in Vietnam. On 24 November 2018, she created history by becoming the first woman to win 6 World Championships, achieving this feat at the 10th AIBA Women''s World Boxing Championships held in New Delhi, India. She won the Padma Shri in 2006, Padma Bhushan in 2013, and Padma Vibhushan in 2020. Mary Kom did not just make herself recognized as a national athlete but also became a role model for females all over the world. Mary Kom became a source of inspiration when she broke the stereotype that married women especially mothers cannot become successful athlete, through her grit and determination.

1.7- Dr. A.P.J Abdul Kalam

Dr.A.P.J. Abdul Kalam was born on October 15, 1931, in a middle class Tamil family in Rameswaram, Tamil Nadu. His full name is Avul Pakir Jainulabdeen Abdul Kalam. He was popularly known as "Missile Man of India." He was awarded the Bharat Ratna Award in 1997. Though his father was not educated, he wanted Kalam to study. Kalam was a very bright and hardworking student. He was the 11th President of India. He was an Aerospace Scientist and worked at ISRO and DRDO as an Aerospace Engineer. He developed many missile projects of India like Agni, Prithivi, Trisul, etc. He was a writer and has written a lot of books. He has written down his autobiography in a book named "Wings of Fire" in the year 1999. A.P.J Abdul Kalam died in Shillong on May 27 in 2015. He was one of the President who was inspired by many and one among the Indians who made India proud.

1.8 - All About the Padma Awards:-

The Padma Awards are one of the highest civilian honors of India announced annually on the eve of Republic Day. The Awards are given in three categories:

Padma Vibhushan (for exceptional and distinguished service), Padma Bhushan (distinguished service of higher order) and Padma Shri (distinguished service). The award seeks to recognize achievements in all fields of activities or disciplines where an element of public service is involved. The Padma Awards are conferred on the recommendations made by the Padma Awards Committee, which is constituted by the Prime Minister every year. The nomination process is open to the public. Even self-nomination can be made.

BHARAT RATNA- Bharat Ratna is the highest civilian award of the country. It is awarded in recognition of exceptional service/performance of the highest order in any field of human endeavor. It is treated on a different footing from Padma Award. The recommendations for Bharat Ratna are made by the Prime Minister to the President of India. No formal recommendations for Bharat Ratna are necessary. The number of Bharat Ratna Awards is restricted to a maximum of three in a particular year. Government has conferred Bharat Ratna Award on 45 persons till date. PADMA AWARDS-Padma Awards, which were instituted in the year 1954, are announced every year on Republic Day except for brief interruption(s) during the years 1978 and 1979 and 1993 to 1997.

A higher category of Padma award can be conferred on a person only where a period of at least five years has elapsed since conferment of the earlier Padma award. However, in highly deserving cases, a relaxation can be made by the Awards Committee. The awards are presented by the President of India usually in the month of March/April every year where the awardees are presented a Sanad (certificate) signed by the President and a medallion.

1.9-Abhijit Banerjee

Abhijit Banerjee is an Indian American economic specialist who is currently the Ford Foundation International Professor at Massachusetts Institute of Technology. He shared the Nobel Memorial in Economic Sciences with Esther Duflo and Michael Kremer for their experimental approach to take the edge off global poverty. Abhijit and Esther who are married, are the 6th married couple to win a Nobel prize.

Banerjee and his employees try to measure successfulness of actions in uplifting people's lives. For example, even though the polio vaccine was freely available in India, many mothers were not bringing their children for the vaccinations. Banerjee and his wife, Esther, also from MIT, tried and experiment in Rajasthan where they gave a bag of pulses to a mother who had vaccinated her children. Soon, the immunization rate went up in that region. In another experiment, they found that learning outcomes improvised in schools that were provided with teaching assistants to help students with special needs.

His appeal was for individual liberty for freedom from irrational traditions and divisions of religion and society. At a time of nationalistic fervour, he asked for a 'world family' to share the best of humanity's offerings. His life spanned the cusp of two centuries, and his literary genius left its mark on both with thousands of his poem, stories, songs and plays. His impact on Bengali speakers, in particular, is matched by few in other language groups in the world.


11.7- Grade 7- Guest Lecture
