Inter house Debate Competition







Inter-house cricket and basketball matches

Soon after Volksfiesta, the people's festival had come to an end, the inter-house cricket matches for both the junior and senior teams had commenced. It was the morning of the 14th of August when the Junior cricket matches took place, the first match was between Prasinus and Caeruleus. Section E-From the Teacher's Desk- Ms. Vedavathi N, Co-ordinator-Kannada, grades 1-10 (Gunjur)

Vedavathi Ma'am is a teacher with a mission. A mission to ensure our students develop the required skills in reading, writing and speaking the language of the state, which we call "Home". The Kannada department at Gunjur strives hard to instill love and respect in the minds of the students and make learning fun and interesting. This month, Vedavathi Ma'am (appropriately posing in front of the ancestral house of Rashtra Kavi Kuvempu!) shares her thoughts on Kannada teaching and learning. Kannada is the state language of Karnataka. It has a rich history of over two thousand years. The Indian government declared it as a classical



language in 2008. My mother tongue is not Kannada, but my interest in the language of the state I live in and the love I have for its rich literature and history, has urged me to take up the challenge of teaching it to students in this cosmopolitan city.

The first question asked by most of my students is, "Why should we learn Kannada? We can easily manage with English and Hindi", but I want to convey to these young minds that learning new language is a skill. You can never get misled if you learn the language of the region you are in. Learning a new language is always beneficial and being multilingual has a deep impact on your intelligence. I would like to share with you some simple tips for learning Kannada. First make Kannada "your" language. Interact with Kannada speakers around you. For example: Talk to shopkeepers, vendors, domestic helpers, friends who know Kannada. You can also learn and practice the language by watching age-appropriate Kannada movies and cartoons, with subtitles, if necessary. Try reading your favorite comics in Kannada! The Kannada department in our school is always trying new activities to make Kannada learning fun and interesting- Word of the day, Kannada conversation activities for higher grades. For lower grades, pick and speak, elocution, conversation-based activities, recitation etc. To develop writing skills, we conduct creative writing, essay writing, advertisement writing etc. during our Kannada classes. Our objective is to instill love and respect in young minds towards the language. We want every child to consider the language as his/her own and communicate in Kannada confidently. We want to change the oft repeated phrase "Kannada gothila" to "Kannada gothu!"
